The Australian Ambassador to Indonesia, Rod Brazier, visited Nagari Sungai Buluh Barat, Padang Pariaman, in September 2025 to observe Sekolah Perempuan (Women's School), a community initiative by INKLUSI partner Institut KAPAL Perempuan and local organisation Pambangkik Batang Tarandam (PBT). Ambassador Brazier met with participants and visited their collective vegetable garden, which fosters women's empowerment, economic resilience, and solidarity.

6th Temu Inklusi Calls for Stronger Commitment to Disability-Inclusive Development



The 6th Temu Inklusi was successfully held in Cirebon in September 2025, bringing together over 500 participants from 24 provinces to share good practices and produce 13 recommendations, including the development of an integrated national disability data system, inclusion across all levels of education, and rights-based social protection. The forum concluded with a strong message from Deputy Minister of Home Affairs, Bima Arya Sugiarto, urging local governments to take disability inclusion more seriously.

PKBI and Directorate General of Corrections Launch Care-Based Training Module for Juvenile Correctional Officers



The Indonesian Family Planning Association (PKBI) and the Directorate General of Corrections (Ditjenpas) of the Ministry of Law and Human Rights, launched the "Child and Juvenile Inmate Care Training Module" for correctional officers in September 2025 in Jakarta. Supported by the INKLUSI Program, the module marks a strategic shift in transforming juvenile facilities from corrective institutions into nurturing spaces that emphasise protection, education, health, and participation for children in conflict with the law.

Forest, Ex-Lover, The Way Home: Indigenous Youth Voices Through Film



In September 2025, Kemitraan screened *Hutan, Mantan, Jalan Pulang* (Forest, Ex-Lover, The Way Home) at Komunitas Salihara, Jakarta. Coproduced by Tumbuh Sinema Rakyat and the Kasepuhan Pasir Eurih Indigenous community in Lebak, Banten, the film provides a creative platform for adat youth to express their lived realities, aspirations, and identities. Highlighting issues such as limited job access, economic pressure, and social dynamics, young people were actively involved in scriptwriting and production. Kemitraan plans to screen the film in public venues across the country to amplify their voices.

OSS&L Services: Safe Spaces for Rural Women in Bengkulu



"I used to be a shy housewife who knew nothing about women's rights. After the training, I gained confidence and realised that women deserve to live safely and healthily." — Yurma Yulita

Yurma is a village women's cadre at the One Stop Service and Learning (OSS&L) centre in Bengkulu—an initiative by PERMAMPU that offers reproductive health, education, and social protection for rural women. Run by trained grassroots leaders and youth counsellors through the Women's Forum (FPAKR) and WCC Cahaya Perempuan in Bengkulu, the centre empowers women like Yurma to speak up and claim their rights.

Inclusive Village Indicators



This discussion explores efforts to dismantle structural and cultural barriers faced by persons with disabilities in rural areas-from access to basic services to participation in decision-making. Since 2014, SIGAB Indonesia has led advocacy through Temu Inklusi, developing Inclusive Village Indicators (IVI) that grew from 9 to 11 points by 2024, based on experiences in 41 partner villages. The session highlights IVI's impact on village governance and the challenges of expanding inclusive practices nationwide.

The Australia-Indonesia Partnership Towards an Inclusive Society, or INKLUSI, is working to increase the participation of marginalised groups in, and their benefit from, Indonesia's socio-cultural, economic and political development. INKLUSI works with government and civil society partners to advance their work in gender equality, the rights of persons with disabilities and social inclusion. INKLUSI supports the Government of Indonesia's agenda for inclusion, including through national development plans and the Sustainable Development Goals. INKLUSI is an 8-year (2021-2029) bilateral Australian and Indonesian Government program with a budget of up to AUD 120 million. It is partnering with 11 Indonesian civil society organisations, 8 research partner institutions and their networks across 33 provinces, >120 district/cities, >800 villages in Indonesia.
