Inclusive Leadership Brings Change to East Sumba Village

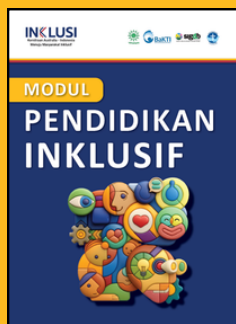
"There is little point in changing only one village. People will continue to face the same pressures elsewhere."

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The Australia-Indonesia Partnership Towards an Inclusive Society, or INKLUSI, is working to increase the participation of marginalised groups in, and their benefit from, Indonesia's socio-cultural, economic and political development. INKLUSI works with government and civil society partners to advance gender equality, the fulfilment of the rights of persons with disabilities, and social inclusion. The program supports the Government of Indonesia's agenda to realise an inclusive society, in line with national development plans and the Sustainable Development Goals. INKLUSI is an eight-year partnership program between the Government of Indonesia and the Government of Australia (2021–2029), with a budget of up to AUD 120 million. In Phase 2 (2026–2029), the program partners with 10 Indonesian civil society organisations and their networks across 32 provinces, >100 districts/cities, and >600 villages in Indonesia.
